#### CHRISTMAS POINSETTIA BASKET INSTRUCTIONS

The entire piece is done in open work.

- 1. Mix the pen medium according to product instructions. I like to use my own, or Alice Wofford's. I mix dry paint with the pen medium and it will dry. If mixture it too wet it will not hold its shape. If mixed too dry it will not flow off the nib. If the nib is worn out it will not flow, nor will it if you try to go too fast. Hold the pen more upright than you would a pencil and go slowly. If you are fighting it, one of the above things is wrong, or you have too much graphite your nib will clog up and not flow. Clean up as you go and fire at any temperature.
- 2. Poinsettia petals are simply leaves painted red. They are very simple and can be finished in two firings; sometimes I can do them in one. I use Kay Knapp's blood red for roses. Pick whatever color you like, but not a cadmium red, it will not fire well nor shade well.
- 3. First, be sure your paint is smooth and creamy so you can load the brush with a smooth coat of paint. Place the paint where you want it in decisive bold strokes. Wipe strong highlights at the center of the leaf on one side leaving the other side darker in the center. Try to do this without fluffing around in the paint. If you can't get any highlight with your brush, use a cloth or paper towel and wipe it with your finger...soften edges slightly. There is no such thing as too much highlight. It can always be toned down with a wash. If you need to darken any of your petals use just a little red grape with your red or a touch of violet of iron. These are still in the red family and won't dull the color as fast as green would.
- 4. The centers are Meissen or chartreuse green, red and bright yellow off to the side. Look them up on the computer or phone and pull them up to study closely...they are fascinating and not at all what most of you think they look like.
- 5. The green leaves are any combination of green you like to use. I used chartreuse, Meissen green and holly and dark royal.
- 6. The bow is red and holly or dark royal, but any green you chose will work if you have used it in the leaves.
- 7. I painted the basket after the flowers and leaves were fired...that insures I don't mess up my leaves or poinsettia petals trying to stay out of a wet brown basket. It is simpler to do it on a different fire. It was painted with a good rich brown.

All my firings were at 016, but that depends on what fire your reds will take. Some of the reds turn brownish if fired hot; I toss those out, but fire your piece according to your red requirements.

#### **Black Coverage Hint:**

"I have mixed my black powdered paint with pure lavender oil and painted a piece of porcelain in one fire. It came out real nice and the lavender oil makes it dry totally before I fired it so it will not run.

It covers real well and does not chip off."

I use Mary Ashcrofts-Seehagen's medium to paint my black or any other color that I want to put on in one fire. It will dry but not at first. I have never had it pop on me. I make sure there is no buildup of paint by pouncing it lightly with a sponge. I use the round pink sponges that have been around forever.
